### Message from Head Mrs. Richardson

I am conscious that in recent weeks I have covered some 'big' topics – bullying, racism, the Holocaust and perhaps as we approach half term it would be nice to focus on some more positive topics!

It has been another busy week at School. It was a great pleasure to attend my first Friends of Mount House meeting (via Zoom) earlier in the week, and I am looking forward to working with the Friends on a variety of exciting ideas.

I know that for many of us, any half term plans might have been curtailed. It is important to be reminded of travel restrictions and the quarantine rules which apply to most destinations. We are reliant on our whole community working together within the guidelines to ensure we can all return to school safely after the half term break. Despite the challenges, I am still very much

#### LAMDA LESSONS



We work with Create Theatre School who run LAMDA Speech and Drama lessons for pupils at Mount House School. The lessons are all taught by Caroline Lau who has 20 years' experience teaching the LAMDA syllabus.

LAMDA stands for the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Arts; it is a famous drama school and one of the oldest examining boards. LAMDA exams help to improve confidence as well as speech; they place a big emphasis on speaking clearly with good diction, as well as expression. These are all invaluable skills for pupils as they progress through education and into adult life. The exams also give children experience of answering questions in a more formal environment with detail and enthusiasm, which is an essential life skill.

### FOCUS ON HISTORY from Mr Phillips



Year 7 pupils are studying 1066 and the Norman Conquest. As the year progresses, they will make their journey through the Middle Ages before they are introduced to the first Tudor monarch, Henry VII. Year 8 are currently making their way through the bloody Tudor period and therefore topics such as the wives of Henry VIII and the Spanish Armada are eagerly anticipated. The rest of the year will focus on revolutions in Britain, Europe and America.

The origins of the First World War are the main focus of Year 9 in the Michaelmas Term. The pupils will soon be studying the course of World War One before moving on to the causes and course of the Second World War.

Year 10 pupils have obviously started their GCSE course and we are engaged in the history of Germany, 1918-45 and the pupils are coming to terms with the demands of history at this level. Year 11 pupils have already started a revision of the course and are looking forward to achieving outstanding grades next summer.

In the Lower Sixth we are investigating the career of Winston Churchill prior to studying British political history from 1955 to the demise of Mrs Thatcher in 1990. Our Upper Sixth students are in the process of completing their A level coursework and preparing for their thematic exam paper, which considers the changing nature of warfare, 1792-1945.

## GREEN TEAM UPDATE – Biodiversity - from Miss Gillett

With a million species at risk of extinction, David Attenborough's documentary 'Extinction' explores how this crisis of biodiversity has consequences for us all, including putting us at greater risk of pandemic diseases. In 2019, a landmark United Nations study found that species extinction is accelerating and when the world loses its biodiversity, it has a huge knock-on effect on our food systems, our resilience to climate change and our defences against disease. "Soil should be teeming with life," says Prof. Richard Bardgett "but reports have suggested that up to 30% of the land's surface globally has been degraded." Bardgett explains that insects in the soil provide a crucial function breaking down organic matter so that the soil is ready for plant growth. Without these vital insects, which are being lost at



an alarming rate, harvests are affected, impacting people all over the world.

The Green Team recognises the importance of biodiversity in the UK and supporting wildlife in our local area. The KS3 & 4 group have been working hard on a proposal for an **insect friendly garden** in the school, which will be submitted to the Senior Leadership Team before half term.

#### MASKS AT SCHOOL - UPDATED POLICY

It is compulsory for students to bring masks to School to use in all communal areas. When students forget, we supply one for them. Due to the volume of disposable masks we are now using which is an environmental as well as safety issue, we now need to provide further encouragement to students to remember to bring their own from home. The new policy to be implemented after half term will be to charge £1 per disposable mask which will go towards a nominated charity.
