


GEOGRAPHY with Miss Gillett

This term Year 9 students are completing a unit investigating climate change is their Sustainable Futures unit. Students have been identifying the causes of climate change, both natural and manmade and are exploring how the enhanced greenhouse effect is impacting all parts of the planet - including its impact on the weather and food supply in the United Kingdom.

This week, we began with a quick True/False activity to check our understanding and see how much we knew about potential solutions for climate change such as global climate agreements and renewable energy.

Year 9 students have also been using an online learning platform called Seneca to check their understanding of climate change concepts. Seneca is great to use as a revision tool as it



presents summarised information on each topic and allows students to answer a variety of different short answer questions, similar to low mark exam style questions they would engage with in GCSE's.

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Our Year 8 students have been investigating urban environments in their Changing Nations unit, with a focus on megacities such as Mumbai, including discussions like:

- How are megacities formed?
- Why do people migrate to large cities?
- What problems occur as a result of their population size and rapid growth?

As a part of their recent Geography assessment, students set out trying to creatively recreate their own megacity at home using what they had around the house. There were some amazing cities constructed from Lego, cake, perfume bottles, pillows and computer programs.



Emmanuela Attakpah Y10 created a visual investigation into the work of Georgia O'Keeffe.






