Message from Assistant Head Craig McCormick In my early childhood, I lived in Glasgow and this was the time of year when the standard topic of conversation was that the "nights were fair drawing in". Many years on, I still cannot get through a December day without commenting to my family about it and then promptly putting the "big light" on in the living room. Although London nights are slightly longer, the physical darkness is descending earlier, and the craving for light becomes far stronger. In complete contrast to the meteorological gloominess around us, December is a time of positivity, rejoicing and of light.



Advent gets its name from adventus, the Latin word for "arrival." As the Christian church solidified in the fifth century A.D., so did traditions around December 25th. Historians have tracked the first formal Advent celebrations to northern Italy, where churchgoers observed a weeks-long preparation for Christmas that involved fasting, prayer, and reflection on Christian values. Eventually, that preparation became known as Advent. By the sixth century, Christians in France celebrated a five-week "St. Martin's Lent" that included fasts.

In 21st Century Britain, for Christians, it's a season of candlelight, reflection, and expectation—a chance to get ready for Christmas, the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ. For many, Advent is the perfect excuse to eat chocolate for breakfast as the doors of advent calendars are torn open before we leave for school or work.

The significance of light is also celebrated at this time of year in our Jewish communities. Hanukkah, which began last Sunday night and runs through until the evening of Monday, December 6th, is known otherwise as the "festival of lights". It commemorates the victory of the Maccabees over the Syrian Greek army, and the subsequent miracle of rededicating the Holy Temple in Jerusalem and restoring its menorah, or lamp. For our Jewish communities, it is a period of gift-giving, candle lighting and a timely reminder that there is no such thing as too many sufganiyot.

While Christians are preparing for Midnight Mass and Jews are offloading the rest of the rugelach, our Sikh community will be preparing to celebrate the martyrdom of the sons of Guru Gobind Singh with services in gurdwaras up and down the land.

At Mount House, we are also celebrating and we have a list of activities in the run-up to Christmas and the eventual end of term on December 15th. However, celebration and light do not exist solely in December, regardless of if you are of religious faith or not. We celebrate the achievements of our students every day they are here throughout the year and we will continue to do so. We shine light on those who achieve academically, who step up for our community, who achieve on the sports field and those who support their friends.



Stand Up! Education Against Discrimination

Today we welcomed Stand Up! Education to deliver a workshop/presentation to our Year 9 students on Anti-Semitism.

Through interactive workshops and drawing on the unique knowledge of many partners in the hate crime field, Stand Up! empowers young people to act against all forms of discrimination, racism, antisemitism and anti-Muslim hatred, while developing their sense of social responsibility in their local communities and British society as a whole.

The workshop's specific aims were to:

- Emphasise British values and educate students about the Equality Act (2010) and different protected characteristics in the UK
- Provide a safe, informal space for young people to explore historical and current issues that affect their lives
- Define racism, antisemitism, anti-Muslim hate and other forms of discrimination
- Introduce the basic tenets of Judaism and Islam
- Discuss and break down stereotypes
- Present verified and reliable hate crime statistics
- Sensitively explore young people's experiences through case studies and real-life incidents
- Analysing what constitutes antisemitic and anti-Muslim rhetoric within the context of conversations surrounding the conflict in the Middle East
- Provide young people with skills and tools to responsibly challenge hate crime, empowering them to become 'Upstanders' in society

Head of Year, it would surely go to me because you bring a smile to my face every day and a fantastic reason to come to work.


Keep up the good work and let us perfect the behaviour aspect and soon you will be the envy of all the other years. Love you all mucho.'

Covid Update from Matt Kerr

With the news that the Omicron COVID variant has arrived in the UK, I am writing to update you on the precautionary steps we are taking in school. As ever, our approach is to maximise the number of students that can safely learn in the building with their teachers.

- 1) As you know, the Department for Education have recommended that pupils wear masks in communal areas in school please reinforce this message at home. Should your child wish to wear a mask in lessons then they are very welcome to do so. We will continue to leave doors and windows open to maximise ventilation within the school building. Please ensure that your child brings a mask to school every day. Masks are available from reception priced at £1 should anyone forget their mask; proceeds will go to charity. If your child is exempt from wearing a mask, please ensure you have contacted your child's Form Tutor to let them know.
- 2) In addition, please continue to complete your twice weekly lateral flow tests on a Sunday and Wednesday evening. As a community, we have a number of individuals with underlying health conditions so it is important that we look after each other by completing this testing. New test kits can be obtained from reception.
- 3) The government have also changed the guidance regarding public transport. It is now mandatory for face masks to be worn on buses and trains and this change is likely to be followed by a greater enforcement including fines for non-compliance. With this in mind, I would be grateful if you could speak to your child about the importance of wearing a mask whilst travelling to school.
- 4) The Department for Education has asked secondary schools to be ready for return to school testing on site in January 2022. After this "test on return", students should continue to test in line with government guidelines. We are preparing for this and will send out more details when they are available.
