Message from Mr Phillips, Assistant Head

ELIZABETH II – 70 GLORIOUS YEARS. A MOUNT HOUSE TRIBUTE TO HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN IN HER PLATINUM JUBILEE YEAR.

This coming Sunday, 6 February, we mark the accession of Queen Elizabeth II to the British throne in 1952. She will have reigned for 70 years and thus during the course of this year, we will be celebrating her Platinum jubilee.

The new young monarch ascended the throne upon the death of her father, George VI. The King had died peacefully in his sleep at Sandringham in Norfolk and at the time of her accession, the new Queen was in Kenya at the start of a tour of the Commonwealth.



In February 1952, Winston Churchill was Prime Minister, Eisenhower was President of the United States, Stalin was still leader of the Soviet Union and Chairman Mao was in the process of consolidating a communist regime in China.

Princess Elizabeth as she was, in April 1947 made a radio broadcast in which she made a solemn vow on the occasion of her 21st birthday:

'I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service...'

With a profound sense of duty, the Queen has remained true to her vow. Her long life and reign has been one of selfless service to the people of Britain and the Commonwealth.

By quite a margin she is Britain's longest serving monarch and the Queen is as much of our culture as red post boxes, as familiar as cloudy skies and as reassuring as scones and jam. When she was born in 1926 the royal family was at the top of society and at the top of the world in which Britain, with an imperial responsibility covering a quarter of the globe, was still the dominant power.

With ever-gathering speed, that world has changed forever during Elizabeth II's reign. She has been at the centre of extraordinary events for decade after decade. And yet, she has weathered them all.

I am especially reminded of her visit to the Republic of Ireland in 2011. Dressed in emerald green, the Queen, aged eighty-five, made one of the most significant speeches of her life. 'It is a sad and regrettable reality that through our history our islands have experienced more than their fair share of heartache, turbulence and loss. These events have touched many of



us personally...To all those who have suffered as a consequence of a troubled past I extend my sincere thoughts and deep sympathy.' This was a highly emotional trip, recalling the murder of Lord Mountbatten by the IRA in 1979, and centred on a visit to Croke Park, the stadium and headquarters of the Gaelic Athletic Association where, in 1920, fourteen innocent people were shot by police and auxiliaries loyal to the Crown – to her grandfather, King George V – at the beginning of the bloody struggle for Irish independence. During the visit the Queen shook hands with a representative of the diehard republican Sinn Fein. Without doubt, the Queen has the capacity for forgiveness and reconciliation.

However, the Queen is still charged by some with being out of touch and slow to react and even her most loyal admirers would not describe her as a force for change. For example, the Queen successfully resisted an attempt by Tony Benn (when Postmaster-General in the mid-1960s) to have the sovereign's profile removed from British postage stamps.

The world changes: The Queen, thank goodness, does not. She keeps her profile on the postage stamps, not for reasons of vanity, but because that is where it belongs, that is where you expect it to be.

Elizabeth II, our Queen, is an example to all her people. She is renowned for her diligence and strong sense of duty, and diligence is one of the seven heavenly virtues of the Christian tradition. Unfortunately, it is a virtue that is slowly eroding in our generation. In a time where almost everything can be done at the push of a button, persistence and hard work may seem like an outdated notion – not, fortunately, for Elizabeth II.

There can be no doubt that through her service and devotion to duty, the Queen has a love for her people and the Commonwealth. Love transcends all faiths in our country. In his letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul describes love in the following way.

'Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonour others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres'.



These words seem to describe our Queen perfectly and as Britain and the Commonwealth start to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee, I feel compelled to quote from the last verse of the national anthem:

'Thy choicest gifts in store, On her be pleased to pour, Long may she reign! May she defend our laws, And ever give us cause, To sing with heart and voice, God save the Queen!'
