# Message from Mr McCormick, Assistant Head

This week, many Mount House students had the privilege of meeting one of the last remaining survivors of the Nazi Holocaust between 1939 and 1945. Ivan Shaw, who is 83, addressed us via a Zoom link from his home in Hertfordshire where he detailed his experiences.

Born in Novi Sad, in modern day Serbia, to a Jewish mother and a non-Jewish father, he experienced no anti-Semitism in his young life until the Nazis invaded Yugoslavia and brought their ideas about race and identity to their newly conquered lands. In 1944, as a five-year-old, Ivan's mother was rounded up for transportation to a concentration camp. His father,



assuming his children would be left alone, volunteered to accompany his wife, and Ivan's mother, on the cattle trains that were to transport Jews towards the ending of their lives.

Ivan was taken in by a family friend, but betrayed by one of their neighbours, resulting in he himself being rounded up. He was imprisoned with adults for ten days, during which time an aunt got wind of the situation and conspired to rescue him. On the march towards a camp, which was scheduled to take several days, his aunt tracked the marching line, stole him out of it and ran and hid in a forest where they were to remain for two days until they both returned to the aunt's home where Ivan hid for the rest of the occupation. In 1947, Ivan was assumed an orphan, and he came to live with family in the UK, and in 1953, he anglicized his surname.

One of the most poignant questions asked of him, proffered by a student in Year 9, addressed the idea of whether he hated people for the experiences that he was subject to in his young life. He said that although some people had treated him severely, and put his life in peril, that it was just some people, a crazed minority. Hate rarely has justification, and we should not treat any group of people by their worst example. This is an important lesson to learn for our community especially in the polarized world in which we live today.

You will no doubt be following the news on the current events unfolding in Ukraine, and it is important for our community to differentiate the actions of a government from the actions and attitudes of the people that it rules. The book, "Prisoners of Geography", by Tim Marshall, is well worth a read for an insight into the geopolitics of the region.

# **MATHS**

#### Welcome to Mrs Onal's Year 10 Maths Class

This provides an update on what your son/daughter has been learning in mathematics at Mount House School. We have covered many topics on Algebra such as simplifying expressions, expanding brackets, factorisation, multiplying more complex expressions, quadratic factorisation as well as setting up and solving equations.

During the lessons, we also talked about where we use algebra in real life. For example:

#### Algebra on the road



Algebra has made it possible for computers and artificial intelligence (AI) to control vehicles without the need for drivers.

A driverless car uses algebra to calculate exactly when it is safe to turn, brake, stop, and accelerate based on the information its computer records of the car's speed, direction and immediate environment.



# **Measuring Medicine**



They use this formula: dose =  $\frac{DV}{H}$ What is the dose when D = 5000 units, H = 10000 units and V = 1 ml? A patient's safety depends upon a nurse's ability to use precise calculations when they administer drug doses. In a study of British nurses, researchers found that nurses in different settings had all been taught what was known as the "nursing rule" for working out how much of a drug was needed. Please see below an example that we used in the classroom.

D= Dose Described

H= Dose per measure

V= Number of measures

# Why is x the most popular letter in Algebra?

We also discussed why x is the most famous letter not m or c or any other, when we are working on Algebra. The meaning of the letter x traces back to the word for "thing".


A puzzle for you to try Just for fun.


