#### MESSAGE FROM MR McCORMICK, ASSISTANT HEAD

I often talk about and write about the importance of community. In a busy city like London, where we work long hours and often in challenging professions, it isn't always easy to take time out from very busy lives to look at the community outside our own front doors. There are domestic decisions to be made, there are families to feed, sometimes work has travelled home with us. On my drive home each night, my primary thoughts tend to be about spending time with my family, about what I might prepare for dinner, or about the nightly cultural feast that is Eastenders, which has long been a guilty pleasure. Despite our busy lives, and our natural instinct to deal with our own events first, we have a wonderful sense of community in this area, and for that



matter at this school. Today's front page message is evidence of this.

Last term, the Schools' Ukrainian Appeal Committee, alongside the Friends of Mount House, organized a range of events aimed at bettering the lives of people who live in what rapidly became a warzone. Events included students and staff dressing up in the Ukrainian flag colours and the Talent Show and Oliver! Production where refreshments were served to help raise money. Events were both well documented and well attended, and special thanks must go out to the Ukrainian Appeal Committee and also to Mrs Clarkson who oversaw this. In total, we raised £1,429.30 in cash and a plethora of goods were also donated. The goods you donated, which are listed below, left in three carfuls from Mount House School to the Ukrainian Centre in Cheshunt. From there they were transported to an orphanage in Boryslaw, which is 100km south of Lviv. The orphanage, built to accommodate 16 young people who have lost both parents, has swollen in numbers during the conflict as young people are sent West to comparative safety. There are currently 40 residents there, ranging in age from 6 months to 17 years old. They received:

1.8L of toothpaste.
110 sanitary towels.
11.5 litres of shampoo/bodywash.
9.25 litres of soup.
39 litres of water.
304 paracetamol tablets.
362 nappies.
1,320 baby wipes.
46kg of clothing.





The money raised was largely spent transporting people from the border posts at Siret and Galati in Romania, to safety in Bulgaria. Your money moved 15 adults and 12 children, 2 dogs, 7 cats and a budgerigar into the country as fleeing families could also bring their domestic pets. In addition, one Ukrainian family was moved from one part of Bulgaria to another to accept employment and education opportunities. The adults were overwhelmingly women, but two men came on journeys paid for by our community as Ukraine have exempted some men who have more than three children from military service. Andrei, a 70-year-old man and Vitaly, his 12 year old grandson, who were living at my house in Bulgaria, are now living in Sofia where Vitaly is attending school and to my shame, speaks better Bulgarian than I. Andrei writes letters my elderly neighbour who writes back. They have been replaced in the house by two women in their thirties whom I was pleased to meet during the May half-term. Your money also bought basic immediate supplies that are used at border posts once people have crossed. On one trip I went on, I drove 576 nappies up to the border, but returned with three women in their thirties and a cat. In addition, first aid supplies were bought. This was arranged by Alex Nicolaides, our Head Boy, alongside Atkinson's Pharmacy in Grange Park who agreed to provide the goods at cost price. These supplies ended up in a makeshift medical centre 50km northwest of Mariupol where those fleeing that city could receive rudimentary treatment.

This only happened because we as a community came together, set a goal, and worked towards it. The success was a by-product of the three previous actions. If we can apply this to everything we do, either in our communities of friendship groups, communities of classrooms or the school community at large, there will always be success. In this case, we saved lives. Thank you.
