MESSSAGE FROM MRS HILLCOAT-HYDE, ASSISTANT HEAD

In today's world there are many people who are experiencing a time of intense difficulty or danger, which can otherwise be known as 'crisis.'

This week students' attention was drawn to the economic, the Ukrainian and the refugee crisis during an assembly led by Mr McCormick.

As the cost of living continues to rise, examples drawn upon were, energy prices, mortgage costs and inflation rates. Students were given facts and figures linked to gas and electricity and were able to identify the reason as to why people are cutting back on their usage.



The term mortgage was explained and the fact that interest rates have increased, allowing students to understand that people's mortgages have increased in costs, which has put pressure on families. The term inflation was discussed and with the current inflation of 10.1% students were able to understand that prices are on average 10% more than they were this time last year. From this I hope that students recognise the difficulty that some people are experiencing and the choices and decisions that people are having to make (food or warmth) during the economic crisis, something that can be taken for granted.

With more than 82 million people living in refugee and displacement camps or away from home, there are more tensions being created amongst host communities which is resulting in families being forced to make dangerous journeys across the water. We know too well that this often ends in fatalities but it also opens up the vulnerable, especially women and children to trafficking and exploitation and as the world grapples with numbers, food rations are being cut for refugees to feed those who will not survive without food.

Russia's invasion of Ukraine has sent shockwaves throughout the world. Above all is the human tragedy – the suffering of men, women and children across Ukraine, among them over 11 million people who have been displaced. Then there are the economic consequences which have spread fast and far to neighbours and beyond, hitting the world's most vulnerable people. With hundreds of millions of people already struggling with lower incomes and higher energy costs and food prices, this has been made far worse and increases the gap of inequality.

Whilst the world faces 'crisis' what touches the heart is the number of children across the world who suffer. The threat of starvation now faces 45 million people in 43 nations around the world. Children in hunger spots do not know where their next meal is coming from.



Millions are living on the cusp of famine and need food urgently if they are to survive. Over 45 million children are affected by malnutrition which has an impact on children's long term physical and mental health and development, meaning they may never grow to their full height or develop their full cognitive potential.

As we start to prepare for the festive season, let's appreciate what we have and take the opportunity to think about those who are experiencing difficult times and how we can support them.

We can show love and kindness towards all members of the Mount House School community, remembering that kindness is not only a means towards a more harmonious society but also a means to helping through more challenging times. We can and have come together as a community to show we care.

BUSINESS YEAR 10 TRIP TO 'TAKING CARE OF BUSINESS' AT THE MIGATION MUSEUM, LEWISHAM

As part of our experiential curriculum, Year 10 students of Business went to The Migration Museum in Lewisham on Thursday 1st December 2022.

Taking Care of Business is an immersive special exhibition about the impact migrant-founded businesses have on all our lives – from the food that we eat to the clothes we wear, the apps on our phones to the products in our homes.





We were lucky to attend a workshop, led by Education

Manager Liberty Melly, which signposted fintech start-ups such as Jamii and King (the creator of Candy Crush), biotech/medical device companies such as Unhindr, as well as historically interesting businesses such as Smokey Joes and Gina Knight's wig business which illustrated the finance and growth challenges of companies.

The exhibition featured hundreds of personal stories of entrepreneurs, from sole trader proprietors to the founders of tech giants, that have transformed Britain. We learned about household names that started as market stalls (e.g. Marks and Spencer) or in garages.



They gave "haircuts" in a barbers, a high-street, "ate" in restaurants and takeaways, and shopped in department stores and corner shops. We heard and read historical and contemporary narratives which highlight the long story of entrepreneurs migrating to and from Britain.

Many of us particularly enjoyed hanging out in the barbershop and the restaurants. The many thumbnail sketches of dozens of businesses were really interesting.

The students enjoyed their visit and Mr Boonzaier, Miss Hassan, Mr Whitehouse and Ms Wong also enjoyed it too!


