## MESSAGE FROM MR PHILLIPS, DEPUTY HEAD (PASTORAL)

On Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> May, the coronation of King Charles III will take place in Westminster Abbey, the same location where William the Conqueror was crowned in 1066 and every King or Queen since that date. Thus, the ceremony is ancient and has its origins in the traditions and mists of the past. The Archbishop of Canterbury will perform the sacred act of anointing the King with holy oil, which can be traced back to the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> centuries, and signals the monarch has been chosen by God.



The coronation will be an Anglican service. However, as King Charles has said, Britain is a community of

communities and much thought has been given about how to reflect the different faith communities within the Abbey. There is a feeling that Britain should be able to see itself in the congregation of Westminster Abbey.

Therefore, the coronation will recognise and celebrate tradition as well as contain elements that reflect the diversity of our contemporary society. As part of the service, Muslim, Hindu, Sikh and Jewish peers will present the King with pieces of the coronation regalia, including bracelets, the robe, the ring, and the glove. After the religious service has ended, the King will receive a greeting by Jewish, Hindu, Sikh, Muslim and Buddhist leaders. This clearly reflects the religious diversity of the realms of Charles III and is in keeping with the King's deeply-held belief in promoting unity between the different faiths. He does not intend to be just the Defender of the Protestant faith; he intends to be the defender of all faiths.

The blessing will be shared by leaders of different denominations for the first time, including the Catholic Cardinal Vincent Nichols. Also, female clergy will be involved in the coronation service for the first time after the Church of England allowed women to become bishops in 2014.





This inclusive approach to the coronation enjoys the support of the Archbishop of Canterbury: 'It is my prayer that all who share in this service, whether they are of faith or no faith, will find ancient wisdom and new hope that brings inspiration and joy'.

Therefore, the coronation will not be a symbol of a power and a splendour which is gone, but a declaration of the hope for the future. The service will attempt to bring together the past, the present and the future.

The theme of the service is 'called to serve' and the coronation weekend will end with the 'Big Help Out' on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> May. Created by Britain's best loved charities, it will highlight the positive impact volunteering has on communities across the nation. Jon Knight, the Chief Executive of the Together Coalition, suggests the 'Big Help Out' is going to be a festival of volunteering. A day when people up and down the country will roll up their sleeves and do their bit. I hope that many people on this day will do all they can to help others and



spend at least one day living a life beyond themselves. www.thebighelpout.org.uk



I hope that everyone, monarchist or not, will enjoy the solemnity and beauty of this special occasion. It will be a time to come together with friends and family, to celebrate and look to the future with hope.

For the first time, all in Britain will be invited to swear allegiance to the newly crowned monarch. I will certainly do so!
