SPEAKERS' CORNER – GLOBAL STUDIES

On Monday during the school assembly, two sets of students addressed the school.

Isabella B and Daniela V in year 7 addressed the school on the issues surrounding **bullying in the UK**. Both students spoke eloquently and passionately, highlighting the growing challenge we all face in confronting all forms of bullying wherever it occurs. Their speech was warmly welcomed, receiving a rapturous round of applause.

This was followed by four year 9 students who had entered a joint Global Studies / Speakers' Corner competition in providing **solutions to the Russian Ukrainian war** which has been raging since February 2022.

The year 9 students were Eve H, Liam R, Jennifer D and Lizzie J.

All four students offered potential solutions to the war from encouraging a diplomatic solution to reinforcing sanctions against Russia. Other solutions included the possibility of NATO taking stronger action in providing further weaponry; or indeed encouraging Ukraine's surrender of the territories that it has lost in the hope that will bring a permanent peace.



The students spoke clearly, providing insight into and understanding of the ongoing conflict that has had such a devastating impact on so many people's lives, not just in Russia and Ukraine, but throughout the world.

The joint winners of the competition were **Eve** and **Lizzie**. Liam and Jennifer were judged to be joint second.

FACULTY NEWS: FRENCH


Spotlight on Speaking skills in Languages

Parlez vous Français / habla Español?

Speaking skills are important when you are learning a language and at Mount House school, students start practising these from their very first lesson in year 7.

The Modern Languages department uses fun activities to help students develop their confidence in using the vocabulary they are learning, and in pronouncing new phrases.

A firm favourite is Mind Reader, where one student is selected to write one sentence from the board on their whiteboard, and the rest of the class has to try and guess the sentence that has been chosen by saying it aloud.







'La Trappe' is also a popular speaking game and it encourages students to memorise chunks of

language and practice pronunciation. It is played in pairs, with each partner trying to guess the 'story' that their opponent has chosen. The partner guessing has to return to the beginning of the story and start again each time their opponent says 'la trappe!' which means that they have guessed incorrectly.



In years 10 and 11, speaking skills take on a more serious tone as students prepare themselves for their GCSE speaking exam. This has three parts – a role play, where students communicate in various situations which can include booking a train ticket, making enquiries at a tourist office and talking to a French/Spanish friend about school. The second task involves describing a photograph/image on a certain topic, and then answering other questions on the same topic. The third part concludes with the student talking for one minute about a topic of their choice, e.g. holidays, the environment, future plans and careers and festivals and celebrations, and then answering unseen questions on two topics, one of which is based on their presentation. In total, students speak for 12 minutes in their exam.



At A Level, students discuss social and political issues affecting France, Spain, francophone and Hispanic countries. They also prepare a project on a topic of their choice which they present in their speaking exam. In the past, our students have researched the Cuban revolution, the drug baron Pablo Escobar, immigration, the role of women before and after dictatorships, the portrayal of Marie Antoinette and whether she was a feminist, the life and scandal of Coco Chanel, the carceral system in France from the 18th century to present day as well as the influence and contribution of immigrants to French society.

As you can see, learning a language is demanding and the Modern Languages department is very happy to teach at Mount House, and very proud their GCSE and A Level students every year.
